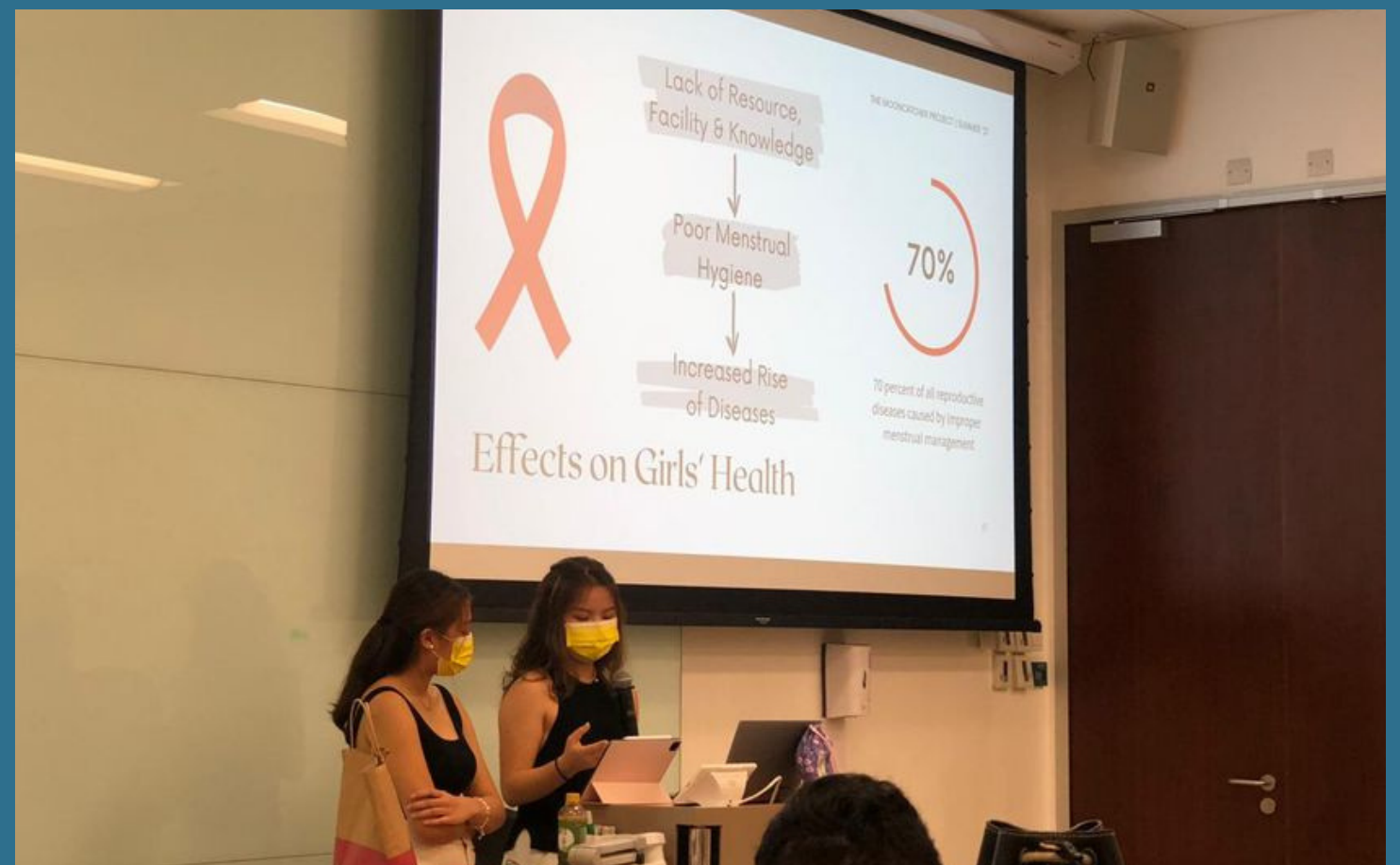


MOONBEE PROJECT



The MoonBee project was successfully held on 31st July 2021, in collaboration with a US-based non-profit organization, The Mooncatcher Project. The organization aims to optimize girls' lives worldwide by removing barriers related to menstruation. It is our pleasure to connect with this organization and expand our service overseas.

We recruited more than 30 HKU students to participate in our workshop. Starting off with an introduction about our vision and the current situation in India, we learnt about how period poverty severely impacted girls' education and their quality of life. We then worked together to trim cloths, aiming to make 30 reusable and washable menstrual kits for a community in India. Our goal was to spread the message on girls' empowerment and gender equity in Hong Kong, India, and beyond.



After the workshop, we invited a local sex-toy shop representative for a talk for our participants to gain knowledge on culturally sensitive topics and spread awareness about sex positivity and disease prevention.

We spent a pleasurable afternoon sharing meaningful moments with the volunteers and helpers, and gained knowledge through the informative talks. We hope that the underprivileged schoolgirls can manage menstruation with dignity and never let menstruation be an obstacle to their education.



REGISTRATION DAY



The Registration Day was held from 15th to 17th August 2021. A well-decorated booth with the theme of Donald Duck was set up. It aims to introduce our club to freshmen, recruit new members and attract HKU students to join our future activities, especially for the orientation Day. We displayed photos of our past events, hung up posters of future events, and distributed leaflets with information about our club. Many freshmen and other HKU students are interested in our club. They came to enquire about our club's vision and activities. And we shared our experiences of previous events with them. For example, we introduced the activity cooperated with MoonBee Project to them. After our thorough introduction, they found our events meaningful and attractive, and registered as our members. We also invited the new members to join our orientation day which is an event for our members to meet new friends. Last but not least, we also gave out souvenirs to our new members and we all enjoyed the time spent with them.

With the aid of other groupmates, the people who act as the disabled need to complete some tasks. They can understand the obstacles of the disabled people by experiencing their difficulties. We hope to improve their empathy and thus they are willing to serve the needy in our community.

Before the end of orientation, all participants sat in a circle to reflect on the experience of the day and share their thoughts with others. They did not just make new friends here, but also developed personal growth.

This year, we watched a documentary film, Audrey and Daisy, during our Movie Night to raise awareness for sexual assault survivors. The documentary featured two cases of teenage rape in the United States, as well as voices of different parties supporting women empowerment.
